



## FUND AIM

The objective of the fund is to generate income in excess of the FTSE Europe ex-UK Index over rolling 3 year periods.

## RISK AND REWARD PROFILE

- If you do not understand this document we recommend you seek additional information to help you decide if this fund is right for you.



## FUND SNAPSHOT


- Aims to generate attractive above-market income as part of a total return strategy

## FUND MANAGER COMMENTARY

After a strong start to the year, there was a dramatic turn of fortunes during May in what proved a very difficult month for global equity markets. While macro data continues to suggest slowing global growth, much of the current perceived risk in financial markets appears driven by few financial indicators, as the unfolding economic conflict led to a return of recession fears.

Aggravating an already tenuous situation has clearly been unhelpful for stability, as the escalating war of words between the U.S. and China heated up. The month then concluded with President Trump announcing more tariffs, this time on Mexico. In Europe, elections were in focus, though there were no surprise outcomes. The second estimate of Eurozone GDP growth was confirmed at +0.4% QoQ, with consumption and investment making positive contributions. However, sentiment indicators and PMI readings were more mixed. Finally, a solid Q1 reporting season has resulted in an improvement in earnings revision ratios.

There were few hiding places as the majority of countries saw negative returns during the month. Cyclical industries were hit especially hard, notably resources and industrials. Conventional defensives saw relative outperformance, which extended to other safe haven assets. At the country level, there was a wide divergence in performance, as illustrated between the resolute Swiss market and Italian equities, which suffered most. From a style perspective, value stocks underperformed, while low beta and quality stood out.

For the L&G European Equity Income fund, we saw a negative return of -6.2% in May. Stock selection and sector allocation were both detrimental to performance. Selection in autos, industrial goods and resources were the biggest negatives as worries about trade and Chinese growth inevitably hit the big global industrial and autos players. On allocation, the overweight in banks was also unhelpful, with financials sitting near the foot of the performance table. On reflection it proved a difficult period for contrarian investors.

He joined from the in-house pension scheme at BAE Systems, where he was head of the European equities team, and a member of the asset allocation committee. Previously, he managed European equities for institutional and retail funds at Henderson Global Investors and HSBC Asset Management. He started his career at Phillips & Drew in 1992, where he spent 10 years investing in UK, European and Japanese Equities. He has an MA in PPE from New College, Oxford. Andrew is a CFA charterholder (since 1998) and an ASIP.
