Manager's Investment Report

Investment Objective and Policy

In line with the updated rules and guidance for the asset management industry published by the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) in February 2019, we have clarified the Investment Objectives and Policies for our UK regulated funds.

The revised Investment Objective and Policy came into effect on 7 August 2019. The previous and revised Investment Objective and Policy are set out below.

Prior to 7 August 2019

The objective of the Fund is to provide long-term growth of both capital and income. The Fund will invest in shares, fixed interest securities and other assets including those giving indirect exposure to commodities and real property. Between 20% and 60% of the Fund's property will be invested in shares.

Exposure to these asset classes will be achieved generally through investment in collective investment schemes but may also be achieved by investing directly in the assets. At times the Fund may be fully invested in collective investment schemes only or directly invested only. The collective investment schemes invested in may include those managed by Legal & General.

The Fund may also invest in other transferrable securities, other collective investment schemes, money market instruments, deposits, cash or near cash.

The Fund will use derivatives for Efficient Portfolio Management purposes.

From 7 August 2019

The objective of the Fund is to provide a combination of growth and income.

The Fund is actively managed and will have exposure to shares in companies, bonds (both corporate and government), money market instruments (such as treasury bills), cash, deposits and indirectly to property and alternative asset classes (such as commodities). The shares in companies and bonds may represent all economic sectors and geographical areas.

The Fund will have exposure of between 20% and 60% to shares in companies and at least 30% of the value of the Fund to bonds and money market instruments.

To obtain the exposure to shares in companies, bonds, money market instruments and cash, the Manager may invest directly and/or in collective investment schemes (both active and index tracker) including those which are operated by the Manager or an associate of the Manager. At times the Fund may be fully invested in collective investments schemes only or direct investments only.

The Fund may only use derivatives for Efficient Portfolio Management purposes.

Manager's Investment Report

During the year under review, the mid price of the Fund's I-Class accumulation units rose by 5.98%. The Fund under-performed its benchmark, as funds within the Investment Association Mixed Investment 20-60% Sector delivered an average return of 6.00% (source: Lipper Hindsight).

Market/Economic Review

Over the last 12 months, global economic indicators have highlighted a synchronised slowdown although activity continues to expand. The closely-watched global manufacturing PMI Composite Index fell back to its lowest level for three and a half years in February. This was partly a result of the US-China trade dispute, but also reflective of a slowdown in the Chinese economy. Worldwide, inflationary pressures have remained subdued by historical standards. Having risen to its highest level in four years in early October, the oil price (Brent crude) declined sharply to just over \$50 per barrel in December, its lowest level for 15 months. This was driven by increased levels of supply, notably US inventories, before rallying during the opening quarter of 2019.

In the US, growth has been underpinned by improving consumer and business sentiment, as the impact of tax cuts and a strong labour market have boosted domestic demand in an economy which is less dependent on world trade. The Federal Reserve (Fed) raised interest rates three times over the last twelve months and continued to unwind its asset purchase programme, known as quantitative easing (QE). In January, the Fed called a halt to its programme of interest rate hikes, citing slowing global growth, the ongoing US-China trade dispute and tighter financial conditions; and recently opted to cut interest rates by 0.25% as a 'mid-cycle policy adjustment'.

In contrast, there has been a sharp loss of momentum in the Eurozone. Business confidence in Germany weakened to its lowest point since 2013 in July, casting renewed doubts as to the health of the Eurozone's largest economy. The European Central Bank recently signalled it stood ready to cut interest rates and embark on a fresh round of asset purchases, with inflation still well below its 2% target.

In the UK, economic and political uncertainty has heightened over the last 12 months, with precariousness as to the outcome of Brexit negotiations and the implications for future trade with the EU. The risk of a disorderly Brexit increased with the new Prime Minister emphasising the desire to leave the EU 'come what may' by the end of October. The UK economy shrank during the second quarter for the first time in almost seven years, as stockpiling activity slowed and Brexit uncertainty intensified against a backdrop of weaker global growth.

Ongoing trade tensions with the US, weakening global demand and off-balance-sheet borrowings by local government combined to result in the lowest rate of growth for the Chinese economy since the first quarter of 1992.

Fund Review

The Fund produced a positive return over the review period.

The Fund's equities allocation was a key contributor to Fund performance. The standout performer during the period was US equities. Having suffered during December 2018, they rebounded strongly in early 2019 and contributed alongside European and UK equities in Sterling. Emerging market debt in hard and local currency were also positive contributors. Our exposure to Sterling partially offset this positive performance, as the pound fell against the US Dollar on Brexit news.

In terms of recent portfolio activity, we increased the Fund's cash buffer through inflows in order to increase our flexibility to initiate positions when attractive entry levels arise. We closed the position in French OATs after strong performance and also generally reduced our view on duration across other regions as global bond yields have fallen. Similarly, given our negative bias to duration, we switched some UK credit from all maturities to short duration and reduced our exposure to global inflation-linked bonds.

Outlook

The notion that equity and bond investors are pricing different scenarios of the future has received a lot of attention recently. However, unlike some market commentators, we don't think there is a disconnection that demands one or the other to re-price sharply.

In fixed income, lower yields are sometimes a reflection of the market's declining growth expectations, but there can be other reasons for such moves. In recent months we have, at least in part, been dealing with a change in the Fed's thinking as it has placed greater weight on the drop in inflation expectations and signalled that they are willing to cut rates despite a still relatively steady economy. From the equity investor's perspective, this shift is a net positive: it should mean continued economic growth will not in its own right prompt higher interest rates.

Assuming the Fed's stance doesn't continue to shift, we believe growth should begin to dominate equities again, especially after the G-20 summit saw some better than expected progress in the Sino-American trade feud. Therefore, on balance, we have a modest positive view on equities and risk assets over the medium-term, as we believe we are still in a "Goldilocks world" of reasonable growth, low inflation and accommodative central banks. We believe recent developments have extended the economic cycle once again and the bull market will likely only end when the cycle ends.

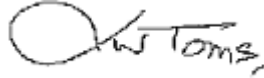

Statement of Responsibilities

Statement of the Manager's Responsibilities

The Collective Investment Schemes sourcebook published by the FCA, ("the COLL Rules") require the Manager to prepare financial statements for each annual accounting period which give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Fund and of the net income and net gains or losses on the property of the Fund for the period.

In preparing the financial statements, the Manager is responsible for:

- selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently;
- making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- following UK accounting standards, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland;
- complying with the disclosure requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Management Association in May 2014;
- keeping proper accounting records which enable it to demonstrate that the financial statements as prepared comply with the above requirements;
- assessing the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern;
- using the going concern basis of accounting unless they either intend to liquidate the Fund or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so;
- such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; and
- taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and irregularities.

The Manager is responsible for the management of the Fund in accordance with its Trust Deed, the Prospectus and the COLL Rules.

- the value of units of the Fund are calculated in accordance with the Regulations;
- any consideration relating to transactions in the Fund's assets is remitted to the Fund within the usual time limits;
- the Fund's income is applied in accordance with the Regulations; and
- the instructions of the Authorised Fund Manager ("the AFM"), which is the UCITS Management Company, are carried out (unless they conflict with the Regulations).

Independent Auditor's Report

Independent auditor's report to the Unitholders of Legal & General Mixed Investment 20-60% Fund ('the Fund')

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Fund for the year ended 31 July 2019 which comprise the Statement of Total Return, the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders, the Balance Sheet, the Related Notes and Distribution Tables for the Fund and the accounting policies set out on pages 17 to 18.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view, in accordance with UK accounting standards, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, of the financial position of the Fund as at 31 July 2019 and of the net revenue and the net capital gains on the property of the Fund for the year then ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the Trust Deed, the Statement of Recommended Practice relating to UK Authorised Funds, and the COLL Rules.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) ("ISAs (UK)") and applicable law. Our responsibilities are described below. We have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities under, and are independent of the Fund in accordance with, UK ethical requirements including the FRC Ethical Standard.

We have received all the information and explanations which we consider necessary for the purposes of our audit and we believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is a sufficient and appropriate basis for our opinion.

The impact of uncertainties due to the UK exiting the European Union on our audit

Uncertainties related to the effects of Brexit are relevant to understanding our audit of the financial statements. All audits assess and challenge the reasonableness of estimates made by the Manager and related disclosures and the appropriateness of the going concern basis of preparation of the financial statements. All of these depend on assessments of the future economic environment and the Fund's future prospects and performance.

Brexit is one of the most significant economic events for the UK, and at the date of this report its effects are subject to unprecedented levels of uncertainty of outcomes, with the full range of possible effects unknown. We applied a standardised firm-wide approach in response to that uncertainty when assessing the Fund's future prospects and performance. However, no audit should be expected to predict the unknowable factors or all possible future implications for a fund and this is particularly the case in relation to Brexit.

Going concern

The Manager has prepared the financial statements on the going concern basis as they do not intend to liquidate the Fund to cease their operations, and as they have concluded that the Fund's financial position means that this is realistic. They have also concluded that there are no material uncertainties that could have cast significant doubt over their ability to continue as a going concern for at least a year from the date of approval of the financial statements ("the going concern period").

Independent Auditor's Report continued

We are required to report to you if we have concluded that the use of the going concern basis of accounting is inappropriate or there is an undisclosed material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt over the use of that basis for a period of at least a year from the date of approval of the financial statements. In our evaluation of the Manager's conclusions, we considered the inherent risks to the Fund's business model, including the impact of Brexit, and analysed how those risks might affect the Fund's financial resources or ability to continue operations over the going concern period. We have nothing to report in these respects.

However, as we cannot predict all future events or conditions and as subsequent events may result in outcomes that are inconsistent with judgements that were reasonable at the time they were made, the absence of reference to a material uncertainty in this auditor's report is not a guarantee that the Fund will continue in operation.

Other information

The Manager (Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited) is responsible for the other information presented in the Annual Manager's Report together with the financial statements. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion or, except as explicitly stated below, any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether, based on our financial statements audit work, the information therein is materially misstated or inconsistent with the financial statements or our audit knowledge. Based solely on that work:

- we have not identified material misstatements in the other information; and
- in our opinion the information given in Manager's Report for the financial year is consistent with the financial statements.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters where under the COLL Rules we are required to report to you if, in our opinion:

- proper accounting records for the Fund have not been kept; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements have been prepared in compliance with UK Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Management Association in May 2014 (2014 SORP).

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The principal accounting policies which have been applied consistently are set out below.

(b) Functional and Presentation Currency

The functional and presentation currency of the Fund is Sterling.

(c) Recognition of Revenue

Bond revenue is accounted for on an effective yield basis, calculated with reference to the purchase price. If the Manager believes that future commitments will not be met due to the bond issuer showing signs of financial distress, revenue accruals will be discounted. Any resultant revenue from these issues will then be treated on a receipts basis.

Revenue from distribution and accumulation units in Collective Investment Schemes is recognised when the distribution is quoted ex-dividend.

Equalisation on distributions received from Collective Investment Schemes is treated as capital property of the Fund.

Rebates received from underlying Collective Investment Schemes are treated as revenue or capital depending on the treatment of the Manager's fees in the underlying Fund.

Revenue from offshore funds is recognised when it is reported.

Revenue from derivative instruments is treated in accordance with note 2(i).

All other revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

(d) Treatment of Expenses

All expenses (other than those relating to the purchase and sale of investments) are charged against revenue on an accruals basis.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(e) Distribution Policy

The policy is to distribute all available revenue, after deduction of those expenses which are chargeable in calculating the distribution. In order to conduct a controlled dividend flow, interim distributions will be at the Manager's discretion, up to a maximum of the distributable revenue for the period. All remaining revenue is distributed in accordance with the COLL.

Fund management fees are deducted from revenue for the purpose of calculating the distribution.

Distributions which have remained unclaimed by Unitholders for over six years are credited to the capital property of the Fund.

(f) Basis of Valuation of Investments

All investments are valued at their fair value as at 3pm on 31 July 2019, being the last working day of the accounting year. The fair value for non-derivative securities is bid market price, excluding any accrued interest. The fair value for units in Collective Investment Schemes is the cancellation price or bid price for dual priced funds and single price for single priced funds. The fair value for derivative instruments is the cost of closing out the contract on the last working day of the accounting year.

Where values cannot be readily determined, the securities are valued at the Manager's best assessment of their fair and reasonable value.

(g) Taxation

Provision is made for taxation at current rates on the excess of investment revenue over expenses.

Deferred tax is provided for on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, other than those differences that are regarded as permanent. Any liability to deferred tax is provided for at the average rate of tax expected to apply.

(h) Foreign Exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling on the date of the transaction. Where applicable, assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at 3pm on 31 July 2019, being the last working day of the accounting year.

(i) Derivative Instruments

The Fund may make use of financial derivative instruments for Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM) purposes. EPM aims to reduce risk, reduce costs, or generate additional capital or income for the Fund with an acceptably low level of risk. These aims allow for tactical asset allocation, which is a temporary switch in investment exposure through the use of derivatives rather than trading the underlying securities.

Derivative instruments held within the Fund have been accounted for and taxed in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Authorised Funds (IA SORP 2014). Returns on derivative transactions have been treated as either revenue or capital depending on the motives and circumstances on acquisition.

12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks

The investments of a Fund in financial securities and derivatives are subject to normal market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in such instruments. Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited (UTM) is the Authorised Fund Manager and has responsibility for ensuring appropriate risk management processes are implemented for each Unit Trust.

The UTM Board has delegated the risk oversight function to the Fund Manager Oversight Committee (FMOC), a committee of the Legal & General Investment Management (Holdings) Limited (LGIMH) Board that meets monthly. The primary objective of the FMOC is to ensure proper oversight of the investment management activities and associated services performed by LGIM, its delegates and other Fund Managers, under the Investment Management Agreement (IMA), on behalf of UTM in its capacity as Authorised Fund Manager. The committee consists of senior members of LGIMH and members of the UTM Board. Other senior staff members are also in attendance, as required by the agenda.

Each Fund has Investment Guidelines, an Investment Objective and Investment Restrictions, against which the fund manager will operate. These are set out in Schedule 1 of the IMA between LGIM and UTM. The Schedule is maintained by each fund manager, reviewed by the LGIM Operational Risk and Compliance Teams and approved senior members of LGIMH on behalf of the UTM board. The Schedule provides the detail needed to determine the risk profile for each fund. Fund managers are not permitted to invest into any new instruments without first gaining approval from UTM.

The Investment Objective and Policy of this Fund is detailed on page 2.

(a) Market Risk arising from other price risk

Market Risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices. It represents the potential loss the Fund may suffer through holding market positions in the face of market movements.

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting similar instruments traded in the market.

The assets held by the Fund can be seen in the Portfolio Statement starting on page 9. Movements in the prices of these investments result in movements in the performance of the Fund. The Manager adheres to the investment guidelines established in the Trust Deed, the Prospectus, the COLL and the Fund's IOG, and in this way, monitors and controls the exposure to risk from any type of security, sector or issuer.

At 31 July 2019, if the price of the investments held by the Fund increased or decreased by 5%, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £55,020,266 (31 July 2018: £38,934,046).

(b) Interest Rate Risk

Interest Rate Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in interest rates.

The Fund is exposed to interest rate risk through its holdings in debt securities and underlying collective investment schemes that pay interest distributions. The market value of debt securities and any floating rate payments from debt securities held (and interest rate swaps) may fluctuate as a result of changes in interest rates. This risk is managed by the active monitoring and adjustment of the investments held directly by this Fund and within each underlying Fund that invests in debt securities, in line with the stated investment objective and policy of the Fund.

At 31 July 2019, if interest rates on the Fund increased or decreased by 1 basis point, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £340,255. This represents the Manager's best estimate of a reasonable possible shift in interest rates, having regard to historical volatility of those rates.

(c) Foreign Currency Risk

Foreign Currency Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in exchange rates. This risk may be managed by the use of forward currency contracts or currency futures as necessary.

As this Fund invests in other collective investment schemes that hold investment instruments in overseas financial securities, there is currency risk in respect of the financial instruments held by those schemes.

Forward currency contracts were not utilised during the current year but were utilised the preceding year.

At 31 July 2019, if the value of Sterling increased or decreased by 1% against all currencies, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £1,993,101 (31 July 2018: £1,351,986).

(d) Credit Risk

Credit Risk is the risk of suffering financial loss as a result of a counterparty to a financial transaction being unable to fulfil their financial obligations as they fall due.

Bonds or other debt securities involve credit risk to the issuer which may be evidenced by the issuer's credit rating. Securities which are subordinated and/or have a lower credit rating are generally considered to have a higher credit risk and a greater possibility of default than more highly rated securities.

The Fund's investments in bonds expose it to the default risk of the bond issuer with regards interest payments and principal repayments. At the balance sheet date none of the bonds held by the Fund's had low credit ratings (sub-investment grade).

As this Fund invests in Collective Investment Schemes, there is credit risk in respect of the assets held by these Schemes.

This risk is managed by appraising the credit profile of financial instruments and issuers in line with the Fund's investment objective and policy.

(e) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity Risk relates to the capacity to meet liabilities as they fall due. The primary source of this risk to the Fund is the liability to Unitholders for any cancellation of units.

The Fund can also be exposed to liquidity risk through its commitments under derivative contracts, whereby additional margin payments or collateral payments may need to be posted with the counterparty or clearing house.

This risk is minimised by holding a large proportion of readily realisable assets, cash balances and via access to overdraft facilities.

(f) Derivative Risk - Sensitivity Analysis

Derivative Risk arises from uncertainty about future market movements. This risk is managed by the policies shown within Market risk.

At the balance sheet date the Fund made use of the following derivatives:

Futures (excluding Currency Futures)

Futures are used to adjust the duration and interest rate risk of the Fund, and to adjust the equities exposure of the Fund, in a cost effective manner. The effect of these instruments was to increase the exposure of the Fund to bonds and equities by £28,804,115 (31 July 2018: increase the exposure by £48,038,209), representing 2.36% of the net asset value (31 July 2018: 5.57%).

This results in an effective equity exposure at the year end of 92.71% (31 July 2018: 95.88%) of net assets, which means that the gains or losses of the Fund will be 0.9271 (31 July 2018: 0.9588) times the gains or losses if the Fund was fully invested in equities.

(g) Fair Value

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount for which it could be exchanged between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction. There is no material difference between the value of the financial assets and liabilities, as shown in the financial statements, and their fair value.

Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited acts as the principal on all the transactions of the units in the Fund. The aggregated monies received through creations or paid on cancellations are disclosed in the statement of change in net assets attributable to unitholders.

Fees received by the Authorised Fund Manager from the Fund plus any rebates paid by the Authorised Fund Manager to the Fund are shown within notes 3, 4 and 5 as applicable. Fund Information

The Comparative Tables on pages 34 to 41 give the performance of each active unit class in the Fund.

The 'Return after charges' disclosed in the Comparative Tables is calculated as the return after operating charges per unit divided by the opening net asset value per unit. It differs from the Fund's performance disclosed in the Manager's report, which is calculated based on the latest published price.

Portfolio transaction costs are incurred when investments are bought or sold by a fund in order to achieve the investment objective. These transaction costs affect an investor in different ways depending on whether they are joining, leaving or continuing with their investment in the Fund.

Direct transaction costs include broker commission and taxes. Broker commission includes the fee paid to a broker to execute the trades and research costs.

In addition, there are indirect portfolio transaction costs arising from the 'dealing spread' – the difference between the buying and selling prices of underlying investments in the portfolio. Unlike shares whereby broker commissions and stamp duty are paid by a fund on each transaction, other types of investments (such as bonds, money instruments, derivatives, collective investment schemes) do not have separately identifiable transaction costs; these costs form part of the dealing spread. Dealing spreads vary considerably depending on the transaction value and money market sentiment.

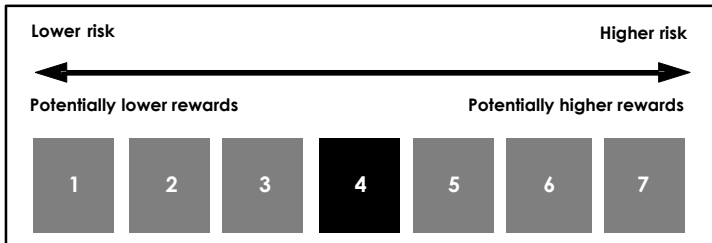
