

FUND SNAPSHOT

- **What does the fund invest in?** The fund invests 90% of its value in collective investment schemes operated by the Manager or an associate of the Manager. This includes investment in L&G index tracking exchange traded funds (ETFs) which are designed to replicate the performance of an index comprised of constituent companies that are determined to be engaged in a relevant growth theme
- **How does it invest?** Actively managed, with holdings in L&G thematic ETFs which provides indirect exposure to an estimated 400-500 companies





FUND MANAGER COMMENTARY

The Legal & General Global Thematic Unit Trust posted a return of -2.5% in GBP terms since launch (26 April 2021). The basket of L&G thematic ETFs remained largely range bound since the beginning of the year on the back of mixed performances across different sectors and regions. Industrials within battery value-chain, clean water and ecommerce logistics themes led the way while healthcare and technology stocks posted lacklustre returns. Year-to-date returns in healthcare were muted possibly as they entered the year after a really strong 2020, while prevailing uncertainty around taxation of technology companies dragged the performance of technology stocks. The first half of May proved challenging as the fund posted negative returns but most of that was recouped in the latter half of the month as the underlying themes rebounded.

With respect to underlying thematic exposures, eCommerce Logistics posted strong returns year to date, followed by Clean Water and Battery Value-Chain; while Artificial Intelligence and Pharma Breakthrough posted marginally negative returns. In terms of allocation of weights (that is based on a diversified risk-parity model), Battery Value-Chain was overweight at ~20.5%, followed by Cyber Security at ~16.6%. Robotics & Automation and Healthcare Breakthrough were underweight at 8.6% and 8.8% respectively.

FUND MANAGERS
